



## A Letter from Fr. Jack Zamboni, Rector

*ment of life. Life is a gift, and it is a terminal gift.*

*Listen to your life.  
See it for the fathomless mystery that it is.  
In the boredom and pain of it no less than  
in the excitement and gladness:  
touch, taste, smell your way  
to the holy and hidden heart of it  
because in the last analysis all moments  
are key moments,  
and life itself is grace.*

Words like these -- from an Ash Wednesday sermon by Br. Curtis Almquist, SSJE, and the great spiritual writer, Frederick Buechner -- gained resonance for me after my late wife Judith was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in the fall of 2012. As often happens at such times, we became much more aware of the preciousness of life -- that life itself is a gift and is full of gifts, every day. Some of you, I'm sure, have had similar wake-up calls to God's gift of life.

The good news is that we don't need to have such experiences in order to grow in awareness of the graciousness of the gift of life and in our gratitude for what we receive every day. What we need to do is pay attention to our lives; to listen to our lives, as Buechner

puts it.

Learning to pay attention to our lives, to listen to our lives, to cultivate an awareness of our lives does not require a life-threatening illness. It does require time and patience. It requires slowing down; taking life moment by moment; being attentive to one *touch, taste, smell*; one word, one sight, one person at a time.

For many of us, this can be very challenging. We live in the fastest-paced, most hectic culture the world has ever known. We are electronically interconnected on multiple devices. Multi-tasking is the norm of our time. We are distracted beyond measure. Living life attentively, moment by moment; aware of each *touch, taste, smell*; each word, sight, person does not come easily to us. It requires learning a new approach to living, and that takes practice.

Summer can be a time to begin that practice. The cultural rhythm of life tends to slow down a little during summer. Vacations can include time to sit quietly, to listen, to pay attention, to cultivate that moment by moment awareness that opens up the experience of the preciousness of life. Slow down this summer and enjoy the gift of life God is giving you, each and every day, each and every moment.

## Bishop' Visitation with Confirmation and Reception May 17<sup>th</sup>, 2020

I'm pleased to announce that Bishop Stokes will be visiting St. Francis on the morning of Sunday, May 17<sup>th</sup>, 2020. He will preside at the Eucharist, preach and administer Confirmation, Reception into the Episcopal Church and Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows.

**Confirmation**, according to *The Book of Common Prayer* (p. 412,) is "a mature affirmation of faith and commitment to the responsibilities of Baptism" for those baptized at an early age. The Bishop administers Confirmation after a time of preparation in which young adults explore what Christian faith and life means in their lives and then decide whether they are ready to recommit themselves to the promises made on their behalf by parents and godparents when they were baptized.

Many older Episcopalians (like myself) were confirmed around the age of 12 (when I was hardly mature!). More recently, Confirmation is happening at 15 or 16 – when young people begin to move towards adult responsibilities of life such as working and driving, and are exploring the life choices they will make when they finish high school. In the canon law of the Episcopal Church, 16 is also the legal age of adult membership for purposes such as voting in the Annual Meeting and serving on the Vestry. Confirmation at St. Francis has been part of this trend over the last decade or more.

In addition to young adults who may seek Confirmation, the Episcopal Church is blessed by the presence of adults who were baptized and raised in other Christian traditions, but who have found their spiritual home in our Anglican tradition. All baptized people are welcomed to join the Episcopal Church simply by stating their desire to live out their Baptism in this community of faith.

In addition, people who come to the Episcopal Church from other Christian traditions are strongly encouraged to be **Confirmed** or **Received** into the Episcopal Church in a special service led by the Bishop. For those baptized (but not Confirmed) in another Christian tradition, **Confirmation** is the liturgical way in which to claim membership in this branch of Christ's one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church. For those been baptized *and* confirmed in another denomination, the same liturgy provides the occasion to be **Received** into the Episcopal Church by the Bishop. People who have been baptized and confirmed in the Episcopal Church may also **Reaffirm Baptismal Vows** as a formal way to publicly reaffirm faith in the presence of the Bishop.

Over the summer, I will be planning an intergenerational Confirmation/Reception/Reaffirmation preparation program to begin in the fall looking towards the Bishop' visit. I'll be reaching out to all those I'm aware of who might be interested/ready for this important step in their lives – but, of course, anyone will be welcome to participate. Look for more information as the summer progresses, but meanwhile, let's all save May 17<sup>th</sup>, 2020 as a special day in the life of St. Francis.

# Health Bits with Chris Cowell

With summer approaching we are looking forward to fun in the sun and outdoors. Here are some tips for staying safe and healthy while enjoying the fun days of summer ahead!!

## 8 Tips to Avoid Summer Bums from the WebMD Archives

### ***Make Yourself Unattractive...***

...to insects, that is. Scented soaps, perfumes, and hair sprays can attract mosquitoes and other biting bugs. Also, avoid areas where insects nest or gather, such as pools of still water, uncovered foods, and gardens where flowers are in bloom, says David Fagan, MD, chairman of the pediatrics department at Nassau University Medical Center in East Meadow, NY.

Use bug spray with DEET. The chemical wards off ticks (which can carry Lyme disease) and mosquitoes (which can spread West Nile virus), Fagan says. Pediatricians recommend 10% to 30% DEET for children older than 2 months, but don't use it on infants.

### ***Use the 20-Minute Rule***

Drink water at least every 20 minutes. To prevent heat stress and heat stroke, adults and children should stay hydrated when outside on hot and humid days. "During activities less than one hour, water alone is fine," Fagan says. But if you're going to be outside for more than an hour, you should add a sports drink to replenish electrolytes.

### ***Play It Safe***

At the playground, take a good look at the equipment. It should be in good shape. Rotted or worn out wood and plastic can have sharp edges and points that could scrape or cause eye injuries. Make sure the slides and other surfaces are cool enough to be comfortable. "Even today's newer materials can cause burns when they've been in the sun for too long," says Jackie Clifton, RN, the emergency department clinical coordinator at Lake Pointe Medical Center in Rowlett, TX.

### ***Stay Street Legal***

Before you head out on a family bike ride, you might want to check on your local laws, says Lee Uehara, the education manager of City Bike Coach in New York. "For example, in some towns, it's illegal to ride with passengers under 1 year of age." And of course, make sure everyone straps on a helmet.

### ***Scan for Bad Plants***

Learn to recognize poison ivy and poison oak, and steer clear. You should also know about other poisonous plants like nightshade, says Carolyn Dean, MD, ND, author of *Kids' Health: A Doctor's Guide for Parents*.

When hiking, carry a book with photos of these plants to refer to in cases of doubt. Yes, you could look them up on your phone. But if you're out of range, you'll want a paper copy to be sure.

### ***Big Adventure? Brag About It***

Tell someone where you're going and when you expect to be back. Someone needs to know where you plan to be, just in case. If you're going hiking or camping, take a first aid kit with you. Dean says it should have antibiotic ointment, adhesive bandages, anti-itch gels, an Ace bandage, and emergency hydration and electrolyte replacement drinks or packs.

### ***Be a Hero, the Right Way***

If you see someone struggling in a pool or lake, you'll naturally want to help. But it's dangerous for you to jump in. "It's more likely that the panicked victim will pull the would-be rescuer under the water with them, than it is for the rescuer to save the victim," Clifton says. Instead, throw a Coast Guard approved flotation device to the person in the water or use a pole to reach them. You should also use these basic water safety tips:

Set limits based on each person's ability.

Stick to pools, lakes, and beaches where there are lifeguards.

Don't let anyone play around drains and suction fittings.

Don't allow your kids to have breath-holding contests underwater.

### ***Go Broad***

Use a "broad-spectrum" sunscreen. "That means it will screen out both UVB and UVA rays," Fagan says. You need it even if it's not a blazing hot sunny day. You should also layers in other protection. "Wear a hat with at least a 3-inch brim all around," Fagan says. "And limit your sun exposure between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. when UV rays are the strongest."



## ***Kid-Friendly Services Coming in June and August***

While Father Jack is on vacation and after Sunday School has concluded for the year, St. Francis will be having “Kid-Friendly” Services. On Sundays June 16th, August 11th and August 18th, Father Frank Hubbard will be our preacher and presider at the 9:00AM Eucharist, (one Service each Sunday). The Service will be “Kid-Friendly” designed to encourage participation by all ages. The sermons will be interactive, include props, and will invite the participation of children present. The service will be shorter and include easily-learned songs. Kids will also be invited to assist with greeting, ushering, and reading. Fr. Frank has extensive experience with this style of worship and looks forward to it very much. All are welcome!

St. Francis is doing a Children’s Book Drive to benefit children who come to Neighborhood Healthy Services Pediatric Clinic in Plainfield. The organization gives young children a foundation for success by incorporating books into pediatric care and encourages families to read aloud together.




