As Easter approaches, we spend the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Holy Week reflecting on the past year and preparing to honor Jesus' resurrection. In 2024, Lent begins on February 14, Ash Wednesday. It officially ends on Holy or Maundy Thursday. That day, the Thursday before Easter, commemorates when Jesus gathered with his 12 disciples to celebrate Passover before he was crucified, which took place on Good Friday. Easter Sunday celebrates the day we celebrate Jesus rising from the dead, three days later.

Why is Easter so early this year? Easter's date changes depending on the year. The holiday is one of several "moveable feasts" in the liturgical year. Others include Ash Wednesday and Palm Sunday. Easter is observed on the first Sunday following the Paschal full moon, which is the first full moon on or after the spring equinox. Since Western Christianity uses the Gregorian calendar, Easter typically falls on a Sunday between March 22 and April 25.

The Lenten season is inspired by the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert preparing for his own sacrifice. In that same spirit of sacrifice and reflection, many people will give up something they love like chocolate, alcohol or another favorite food. But others prefer to spend the time thinking and praying about something important to them. Maybe that includes ways we can work toward being better or more prayerful people or ways to make the world a better place.

Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday share February 14 this year. Love doesn't depend on chocolates. It doesn't depend on greeting cards. It doesn't depend on flowers. It really depends on looking out for the good of the other person and reaching out to those in need. A call or a visit will go a long way to sharing God's love on February 14th and throughout the year ahead.

Wishing you a Holy Lent and a Blessed Easter.

I know, I know... we're all still recovering from the 2023 Stewardship campaign and thinking about the 2024 campaign isn't on anybody's radar yet. But Stewardship doesn't just happen during a finite campaign or a special season – it's a year-round, nonstop activity and attitude. How can we share our wealth, works, and wisdom *today*?

Well, the new church liturgical calendar (beginning in Advent 2023) also ushers in a new yearlong Stewardship theme from our friends at TENS*. For 2024 our theme is *Walk in Love*. Does it sound familiar at all? It should – it's part of an Offertory Sentence we frequently hear:

Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself for us, an offering and sacrifice to God. Ephesians 5:2

They're only three simple, little words but put together they mean soooo much!

"When we walk in love, there is clarity and purpose. We move in alignment with each other and with our values. Walking in love is also something we cannot do alone - by definition it implies connection, community. Whether we walk with our children or our spouse, or form an orderly line, or rely on the help of a friend or a neighbor we carry everyone with whom we are in communion as they carry us with them. Our journey is one made by millions, over thousands of years. A cycle of sharing and invitation.

"What a way to bring our gifts forward: first the bread and wine followed by the offering plates, and finally ourselves - walking in love! When we gather in love, bless, break, and share our gifts and ourselves with the world, we bring healing and transformation to our world.

We are invited on this journey not because we need to suffer as Jesus suffered, but so that we may understand the Grace that comes from living though difficult moments. Jesus models this work, and while he will be martyred and raised, his invitation is not to follow him into death, rather to follow him into the compassion and empathy that come from resisting and crossing over our darkest instincts.

The walk of love teaches us that the path through scarcity and anxiety is in trusting in the abundance we have been shown, the gifts that we have been given. We are, each of us, given gifts to grow God's Kingdom: kindness, generosity, strength, wisdom, creativity, passion, and so many more. Stewardship reminds us to harness and nurture these gifts so that we might be able to share them more extravagantly with those we meet on our journey.

FEBRUARY HEALTHY BITS

Winter in New Jersey can be challenging. Frigid temperatures with snow and ice one day, then almost balmy weather the very next day! During those bone-chilling days, we need to be mindful of safely heating our homes. Below are some heating tips from www.usfa.fema.gov to help maintain a fire-safe home this winter.

Space Heater

- Keep anything that can burn, such as bedding, clothing and curtains, at least 3 feet away from the heater.
- Make sure the heater has an automatic shut-off, so if it tips over, it shuts off.
- Turn heaters off when you go to bed or leave the room.
- Plug portable heaters directly into outlets and never into an extension cord or power strip.
- Only use portable heaters from a recognized testing laboratory.

Fireplace

- Keep a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace to prevent embers or sparks from jumping out.
- Do not burn paper in your fireplace.
- Put the fire out before you go to sleep or leave your home.
- Put ashes in a metal container with a lid, outside, at least 10 feet from your home.

Wood Stove

- Make sure your wood stove is 3 feet from anything that can burn.
- Do not burn paper in your wood stove.
- Put the fire out before you go to sleep or leave your home.
- Have your chimney inspected and cleaned each year by a professional.

Furnace

- Have your furnace inspected each year.
- Keep anything than can burn away from the furnace.

Kerosene Heater

- Only use kerosene heaters from a recognized testing laboratory.
- Make sure the heater has an automatic shut-off, so if it tips over, it shuts off.
- Refuel your cooled heater outside.

Following these simple steps will ensure your homes remain cozy, warm, and safe.

The comedian Robin William's once listed these top 10 reasons to be an Episcopalian:


- **10.** No snake handling.




